2005 Pioneer Award Winner

Cathy Henkel has touched every base as a sports journalist - from reporter, to copy editor to sports editor and even AWSM president. She has been sports editor at the Seattle Times for nearly 15 years and is respected in the position. Maybe this is her secret as an editor: Along with her journalism degree (Wichita State), she also has a Masters in counseling (University of Arizona).

Cathy started at the The Wichita Beacon in 1966 in news, but moved to the sports side of the business in 1976 at the Eugene Register-Guard. She covered high school and college sports as the sole woman at events most of the time. She also worked as a copy editor and then assistant sports editor. The Seattle Times hired her in 1987 as assistant sports editor and she landed the top job in 1990.

The Times has earned several APSE awards under her direction, including five top-10 daily awards. The sports section won the Triple Crown (daily/ Sunday/ Special Section) in 1999, 2002 and 2004. Cathy was one of the editors of the "Coaches Who Prey" series that uncovered abuse by high-school coaches in Washington; the series won APSE's top prize for investigation in 2003 and also the editor on the University of Washington investigation that won the

APSE prize in 1992. She also edited the investigative and news stories on Washington football that led to the dismissal of coach Rick Neuheisel in 2004. Cathy also has been a lead Olympics editor since 1990 and covered the Olympics as a reporter in 1984.

Cathy served as AWSM's vice president of administration for two terms, then as vice president of convention (our Seattle meeting) and as president. A dedicated and inspiring leader, she has earned lots of respect for AWSM in her work as an APSE member and officer. She also has hired and mentored many young women interested in a sports journalism career.

Every field has pioneers and AWSM is particularly proud to honor its own. AWSM's Pioneer Award annually recognizes an individual who has paved the way for women in sports media and who serves as a role model for its members. The honor has been given annually since 1999 to individuals who have distinguished themselves in the field and reflect and advance the values of AWSM.

AWSM congratulates award winners

AWSM members Linda Robertson of The Miami Herald and Meri-Jo Borzilleri of the Colorado Springs Gazette were double-winners in the annual Associated Press Sports Editors writing contest.

Robertson finished in the top 10 for features and game stories in the top circulation category (over 250,000). Her feature chronicled the metamorphosis of Cassius Clay to Muhammad Ali. Her game story was on the 2004 Tour de France.

Borzilleri was top 10 in breaking news and game stories in the third circulation category (40,000-100,000). Her breaking news story was about wrestler Rulon Gardner's last match at the 2004 Summer Olympics. The feature was about two Iraqi wrestlers and their coach.

Other AWSM winners in the top circulation category were Jody Berger of the Rocky Mountain News in the breaking news division (team project), Rena Cash of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution in project reporting (team project) and Susan Vinella of the Cleveland Plain Dealer in project reporting.

In the second circulation category (100,000-250,000), Karen Crouse of the Palm Beach Post won for explanatory reporting. Nicole Vargas of the San Diego Union-Tribune won in the inclusive-circulation investigative division (team project).

On the Public Relations side, AWSM member Rosa Gatti and her ESPN Communications crew took home top honors from PR Week.

Pioneer Award winner announced! Cathy Henkel, the longtime sports editor of the Seattle Times, has touched every base as a sports journalist – from reporter, to copy editor to sports editor and even AWSM president. Henkel will be honored as the 2005 Pioneer Award winner at the annual Pioneer Dinner, held in conjunction with the 2005 AWSM Convention in San Diego. This year's dinner will be at the San Diego Hall of Champions on Sun., May 29.

First keynote speaker of the 2005 AWSM Convention set! Karin Winner, managing editor of the San Diego Union-Tribune, will kick off the 2005 AWSM National Convention with a keynote address at SeaWorld on Friday, May 27.

Named editor in 1995, Winner directed the 1991 merger of the Union and the Tribune, and has since worked tirelessly toward her vision of making the Union-Tribune the best regional newspaper in the country.

The former West Coast editor of Women's Wear Daily for seven years, during which time she helped create W magazine, Winner grew up in La Jolla, has a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Southern California and is a former president of the California Society of Newspaper Editors.

Writing Scholarship – Tania Ganguli, Northwestern Interning at Sports Illustrated

Copy-Editing Intern – Jamie Dougher, UNC-Chapel Hill Intern at The Detroit News

Jamie will graduate in May as a double major in journalism and mass communication/English. She was the Dow Jones Newspaper Fund intern in sports copy editing last summer at The Palm Beach Post in West Palm Beach, FL and the New Jersey Press Foundation intern at The East Brunswick Sentinel and The Suburban in Freehold, NJ in 2003.

She’s been working in journalism since her high school days at Fanwood High School in Scotch Plains, NJ and won the Garden State Scholastic Press Association’s Bob Stevens Memorial Scholarship for Excellence in High School Journalism. Copy-Editing Intern – Dawn Klemish, Michigan State Interning at St. Petersburg Times

Dawn is combining her studies as a senior in communications with work as a sports stringer and agate designer at the Lansing State Journal. She writes features, advances and game stories on high school and Michigan State sports, and, as her editor Brent Neal states, “her game stories put the event into context for readers to give them the perspective they need to realize what the story means to them and why they should care about the people in it.”

Dawn has exhibited such ability even while on the student newspaper, The State News. She has also won the Division I Sports Feature category from the Michigan Collegiate Press Association in 2002 and was a member of the softball team at Delta College.

Public Relations Scholarship – Katie Subach, Penn State Interning at USA Track and Field

Not everyone can say that Donovan McNabb knows them by name, but this Penn State senior met the Philadelphia Eagle quarterback as a Public Relations/Media Relations intern with the NFL team.
